Accreditation Team Invites Public Comments About The Gulfport Police Department

Gulfport, FL - Police Chief Robert Vincent announced today that assessors from the Commission for Florida Law Enforcement Accreditation (CFA) will arrive on Tuesday, April 21st to assess the Gulfport Police Department's compliance with peer reviewed standards. The Gulfport Police Department received initial accreditation from CFA in February of 2000 and has maintained an accredited status since. Assessors will examine all aspects of the Gulfport Police Department's policies, procedures, management, operations and support services. The Gulfport Police Department has to comply with approximately 260 standards in order to maintain its accredited status.

As part of the on-site assessment, agency members and the general public are invited to offer comments to the assessment team. Comments must be in writing and must address the agency's ability to comply with CFA standards. A copy of the standards are available through the police department's Professional Standards Section at 727-893-1111 or 727-893-1123.

The Accreditation Manager for the Gulfport Police Department is Lieutenant Joshua Stone. The assessment team is comprised of law enforcement practitioners from similar agencies: Master Officer Tammy Farnham from the Stuart Police Department, Captain Vic Neal from the Florida Department of Business and Professional Regulation – Division of Alcohol Beverage and Tobacco, and Ms. Brenda Medel from the Orange County Sheriff's Office. The assessors will review written materials; interview individuals; and visit offices and other places where compliance can be witnessed. Once the Commission's assessors complete their review of the agency, they report back to the full Commission, which will then decide if the agency is to receive re-accredited status. The Gulfport Police Department's accreditation is for 3 years. The agency's initial Accreditation was in 2000 and they have successfully earned re-accreditation every three years since then.
